A native of Palo Alto, she studied with Camilla Wicks in San Francisco and with

Her award winning discography includes <i>Electric Diamond, Angel, Konzerto and Succubus</i> and <i>Ariel View</i>. On her own record label Ariel Ventures she has produced <i>Dancing Suite to Suite, camberwood>, Homage to Fiddlers, Bebop for Beagles, Estadio, Russian Soulscapes,</i> and <i>Peace Piece</i>. She filmed Dan Tepfer's <i>Solo Blues for Violin and Piano</i> in Shoal Creek, Alabama, performed with Paul Dresher's Electro-Acoustic Ensemble, and recorded extensively with Russian pianist/composer Ivan Sokolov. Pollick continues her multimedia collaborations with Violin, Viola & Video Virtuosity. While residing in Vilnius, Lithuania she debuted <i>Resonances from Vilna</i> with pianist Jascha Nemtsov in 2014, <i>Nothing is Forever</i> with actor Aiste Ptakauske in 2015, and premiered David A. Jaffe's violin concerto <i>How Did It Get So Late So Soon?</i> with the Lithuanian National Opera & Ballet Theatre Orchestra at the Tytuvenai Festival with Maestro Robertas Servenikas in 2016. Karen performs on an 1860 violin by Jean Baptiste Vuillaume and a 1987 viola by William Whedbee. Karen received a Seed Money Grant for Disseminated Performances from New York Women Composers towards solo concerts with electronics in Seattle, Stanford University's CCRMA, and

Since moving to California in 1981, British-born harpsichordist Jonathan Salzedo has become a popular Freeway Philharmonic collaborator with many organizations including Jubilate, San Francisco Symphony, Symphony Silicon Valley and Black Box Baroque. With his wife Marion Rubinstein, he codirects The Albany Consort, now in its 47th year, which tackles the entire spectrum of baroque music from duos to opera. He performs new music with violinist Karen Bentley Pollick, using the harpsichord in unusual contexts. Once a maker of instruments, Jonathan still enjoys voicing and repair work. He also considers moving harpsichords (generally single-handedly) and tuning them (he is an expert on early tuning systems) to be cherished parts of a harpsichordist's life. Jonathan has two grownup children who are both fine musicians. In his spare time, he sings at Congregation Etz Chayim, Palo Alto, teaches Alexander Technique, and runs a software consulting business.
